vice. From 14th April 2014 the 'Available in Library Collection' box will be ticked by default for standard search. This means your search will only bring back results which you can fully access online or those items that are physically available in the library. This will prevent the frustration of finding the perfect article and then finding we only subscribe to the abstract. If you want to extend your search to include all material indexed by the Discovery Service, you can un-tick the 'Available in Library Collection' option. You may be able to obtain items not fully accessible online or held by the Library using our Interlibrary Loans service.

The Library now has a blog. Along ibrary blod with our social media channels and the News section of the Library website Liblog will give you another way to find out about what's going on in the University Library, including why Sarah was wearing that hat. It will be particularly useful as we move into our refurbishment period and there is already a refurbishment thread running (where you will find that Librarians aren't as beige as you may have thought)
