Other universities have been expressing an interest in our Referencing@Portsmouth website (http://referencing.port.ac.uk).

During the year the universities of Southampton, Edge Hill and Chester have all asked for permission to link to the site. Use of the site has grown rapidly:- last year (Aug—July) we had 82,689 hits. This year so far (Aug—June) we've had 206,351 with May being the busiest

month. Unfortunately we can't tell how many of these were from our own students and staff. We now have a new project underway, which aims to produce small re-useable 'learning objects' which staff can take and drop into e-learning courses. These will be in a variety of formats including short videos, online demonstrations and imagerich webpages. Topics include: finding items on reading lists, finding journal articles, academic reading and an overview of the information landscape. Watch our webpage for details of
