

2010 Journal Citation Reports

The Web of Knowledge have just released their Journal Citation Reports for 2010. Journal Citation Reports is a database containing citation data relating (only) to the journals that are indexed in two of the Web of Knowledge's three Citation Index databases: Science Citation Index and Social Sciences Index. Unfortunately the Arts and Humanities Citation Index isn't covered by Journal Citation Reports, so if the journals you publish in are in this area it is impossible to get reliable citation data for them. For many academics the most useful data in JCR are the **Journal Impact Factors**, the Journal Impact Factor (which often requires interpretation) being a measure of the importance of a particular journal. - * Over 1,300 regional journals
- * 1,075 journals receiving their first Journal Impact Factor

Watch this space and don't forget that you can get it touch with us if you want to know how to have material deposited for you, or to learn to do it yourself.

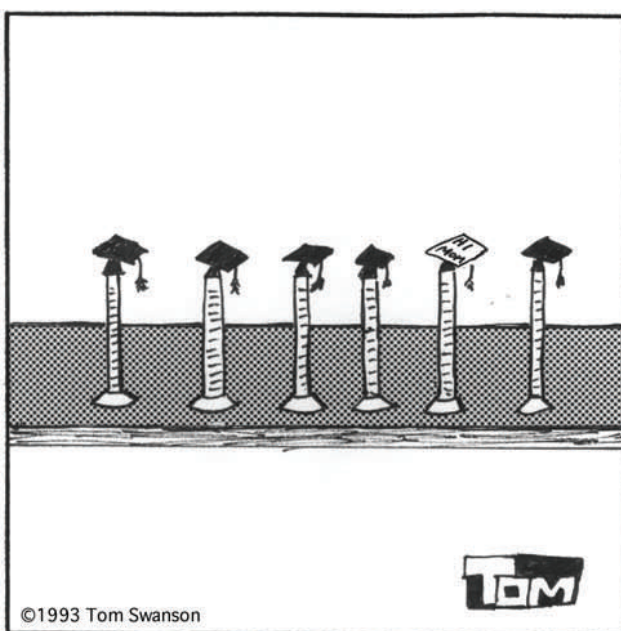
