

Books

Books about quantity surveying can be found in the University Library in shelfmark order, e.g. 692.5. Within each shelfmark books are arranged by a 3 letter alphabetical code which is related either to the author's family name or the first 3 letters of the title. So at 692.5 a book by an author called Ashley (ASH) would be filed before books by Seeley (SEE) or a book by a corporate author called "SPON'S Architects' and Builders' Price Book" (SPO).

You will find most quantity surveying textbooks on the first floor at 692.5. But a surprising number of other shelfmarks will be useful including some on differing floors, see list below. Most books are on open-access shelves and are available to borrow for 4 weeks. Dictionaries and other useful reference sources will have 'For Library Use Only' on the spine.

Finding books on quantity surveying subjects

The **Library Catalogue** is the key to our print resources. It shows you what is in our stock, where items will be found and identifies what is out on loan. If you know the details of a book, type one family name and one or two major words from the title in the search box. From the results select the required book and click on 'check availability' to see the full shelfmark and to check a copy is on the shelves.

You can browse the shelves when looking for a topic but you will miss anything on loan and ebooks. Use the keyword search on the catalogue to find all useful shelfmarks, and to identify and reserve stock that is out on loan. Take time to think about terms that express your subject – ask for help if you do not find what you are looking for.

Journals

Journals contain the latest research and print copies of quantity surveying journals are kept on the top floor of the Library. They are shelved in alphabetical order, either as individual issues in cardboard boxes or bound together into large volumes. Some current journals will have their newest issues on the display near the Library café. These are arranged in broad subject areas such as Architecture, Business and Management, Civil Engineering and Engineering. Key titles of interest include:

Building Economist**

Planning

Note that many journals are available electronically. There are direct links to ejournals when you use Discovery or the Publications search page on the Library website.

Online Resources for Quantity Surveying

Electronic books (ebooks) are in the Library Catalogue. For a Library Guide on ebooks see <https://library.port.ac.uk/guides/docs/LG175.pdf>. If you have conducted a search on the Library Catalogue and only want to show ebook results, click Electronic Books under the “Collection” heading on the left of the result list.

If you are using resources when you are working away from the University campus you can search the full text of over 100,000 ebooks by going straight into one of our ebook collections. Follow the Electronic Books link from our Resources page: <https://library.port.ac.uk/ebooks.html> to see a selection of our e-book collections.

Credo Reference (available via the library catalogue) is an online source of high quality reference books and dictionaries. It even suggests how to reference what you’ve found at the bottom of each entry. More detailed referencing help is available via the Referencing@Portsmouth webpage <http://referencing.port.ac.uk/>.

Finding electronic articles on quantity surveying topics – unless you have been given references by your lecturer and know exactly where to look, you can use **Discovery** to find articles on topics for your assignments. You often get an article abstract and in many cases can link to the full article using the PDF or Locate Full Text links. A Discovery search box can be found at the top right of the Library homepage and also on the **Civil Engineering and Surveying Subject Page**: <https://library.port.ac.uk/subject/sub52.html>. You can also use the eJournals tab (at the top right of the Library homepage) to find which journals we hold electronically.

Sometimes you will need to look for the article in a print journal or, if the journal is not held here, send for an interlibrary loan: <https://library.port.ac.uk/interlib.html>

Discovery does not include all our eJournals and databases. Several specialised resources need to be searched individually. You can find an annotated list of useful databases at <https://library.port.ac.uk/subject/page298.html> but the following are some highlights:

Engineering Village	- a general database that includes civil engineering and surveying with millions of articles from 1000s of journals and links to full text where we have it
Construction Information Service	- technical information, articles, standards and other publications
BCIS Online	- building costs information service for the construction industry
Estates Gazette Interactive (EGi)	- news, research and information from the commercial property market
isurv	- Royal Institute of Chartered Surveyors (RICS) guidance and official documents
RICS Library Services	- property and surveying catalogue of the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors (RICS)

You may also be interested in **Art & Architecture Complete**, **Greenfile** and **Business Source Complete**

Many of these databases are available via the Civil Engineering and Surveying Subject Page under **Subjects** on the Library website. If you are using resources when you are working away from the University campus you will need to login first or set up your VPN.
